### **Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture George Greig to Visit Geissler Tree Farm, Highlight 2011 October Farm Tour in Berks County and “Fall is for Planting” Initiative, October 18, 2011**

Leesport, PA—Pennsylvania’s Secretary of Agriculture, George Greig will be visiting Geissler Tree Farms, Inc. at their 84 South Garfield Rd, Bernville, Pa location on Tuesday, October 18, 2011. He will be highlighting the upcoming Berks Agricultural Resources Network’s (B.A.R.N.) 2011 October Farm Tour, an all-day event on Saturday October 22<sup>nd</sup>, and the Pennsylvania Landscape and Nursery Association’s (PLNA) “Fall is for Planting” Initiative.

The Berks County Farm Tour runs from 9am-4pm and will feature a dozen locations in the heart of Berks County --- Penn, Centre and Bern townships. Participants must purchase an official map for \$10 per carload at one of three locations: Reifsnnyder’s Ag Center, 7180 Bernville Road (Route 183), Bernville, PA 19506, 610-488-0667; Geissler Tree Farms, Inc., 1051 Cross Keys Road, Leesport, Pa 19533, 610-926-4264; and the Berks County Heritage Center, 1102 Red Bridge Road, Reading, PA 19605, 610-374-8893. Combined with more rain than late spring and milder growing temperatures, this is a time of year that lends itself to less stress on the plant as this growing season winds down and which will propel it into a healthy spring.
